# New Pomonas unveiled

The 131st Annual Session of the Connecticut State Grange gave the State Grange Executive Committee the task of creating new Pomona Granges in Connecticut. We have taken this work seriously and committed ourselves to the task of making a plan for strong Pomona Granges for the future. On July 9 we presented the plan for the new Pomona Granges to the membership of the Connecticut State Grange. New boundaries were drawn and we have presented three new Pomona Granges. These new Pomonas equally divide the state and provide the strongest leadership for the Pomona Granges to survive in the future. The next step is for the new Pomonas to meet with their mentors to create new by-laws and elect officers to begin the new Pomonas after November 1, 2017. It will take cooperation from everyone to assure that these Pomonas will succeed. For if everyone doesn't get onboard then this effort can fail and Pomona Granges will no longer be in Connecticut. It is up to us all to see that this new plan for Pomona Granges is successful. Join the winning team!

for your Grange but YOU have to ask. We provide a great community presence but lack on the follow up to gain new members. Our survival demands a change in our tactics to gain new members.



## Statewide Meeting well attended

Over 60 members packed the dining room at Good Will Grange Hall on Sunday, July 9th to hear the State Grange Executive Committee's plan for redistricting Pomonas.

Connecticut will now have three Pomonas rather than the seven currently in operation.

This statewide meeting was open to all members and was an opportunity to ask any and all questions. The final plan is the culmination of nine months of work by the Executive Committee to come up with a plan that would take into consideration factors that included travel times, clustering of active Granges and experienced leadership, among many others.

At the beginning, most members of the Executive Committee were not set on a specific plan. Initial proposals called for 1, 2, 3 and even 4 Pomonas. In the end, the three Pomona plan answered all concerns of the committee, and most importantly, gave the best opportunity for acceptance by the membership.

Prior to the meeting, members of the Committee were unsure of how the plan would be received, despite knowing that it was the best possible course to take. The Executive Committee was applauded for its efforts and the plan.

### What's Next?

The current Pomonas continue to wind down operations by closing out accounts, updating membership lists and taking inventory of regalia and belongings. They will continue to operate until October 31. All Pomonas are expected to select delegates to represent them at State Session and those delegates will serve on Session Committees as they have in the past.

For the new Pomonas, the process of creating new organizations begins. Each new Pomona has been assigned three members of the Executive Committee (list on page 2) to serve as mentors to help shepherd them through the process. The initial meeting for each new Pomona will be called/coordinated by the mentors to "get the ball rolling." Those meetings will be scheduled as soon as possible. All Granges should take part in this process which will include writing by-laws, selecting a meeting day/night, location(s) for meetings, etc.

There are several current Pomonas that do not have degrees scheduled prior to State Session. We do know that East Central Pomona is planning to confer the







### **Your Event is Marketing Gold for your Grange**

Every organization - including your Grange - wants to stand out in the crowd. Hosting events, and then marketing those events to the community, is one way to help Granges do just that.

Most people attend community events for one of two main reasons: to network with like-minded people or to be entertained or educated. No matter what type of event your Grange is hosting, it's of critical importance that your event be relevant to your target audience and those in attendance.

Whether you are hosting a large event, like an Agricultural Fair or Festival, or a smaller event like a quilting workshop or a Zumba class, Grange event marketing needs to be an integral part of promoting your Grange. Events are memorable, make an impact, and offer a unique opportunity for the public to see your Grange up close and first hand. Events draw people into your hall, and showcase what your Grange is all about - as a local organization, as well as a national organization.

Here's a few suggestions to keep in mind when planning and marketing your Grange events.


- 1.) Set realistic attendance and outcome goals, and develop a plan of attack. Don't expect hundreds of people to walk through your doors when realistically that number may only be 50. Setting attainable goals will not only save your Grange money, but allow your members to easily work and manage the event without being disappointed.
- 2.) Incorporate a strong and creative theme. Incorporating a theme into your event will give your members a starting point when brainstorming ideas. It also sets a baseline for your marketing

strategies. Just don't go too far, as that can be seen as gimmicky, and can distract from your Grange's message. In those instances, people remember the gimmick instead of what you want them to remember - your Grange organization!

- Engage with your community. People seek personal connections. These connections can be a recipe for new members and build "brand loyalty" - or in this case - "Grange loyalty." Face to face interaction is one of the best ways to establish and build your Grange. People can sense enthusiasm, but on the other side of the coin, can also sense negativity. What your members are expressing to others about your Grange is important as it can attract interest, or send people running in the other direction. Give them your best Grange pitch, inquire about their needs. In other words, spark a conversation. When your members are promoting your Grange in a positive, yet realistic light while interacting and engaging with others, then your Grange reaps positive benefits.
- 4.) Be sure your event leaves a good impression. Details matter. Make sure your event is organized, and that your staff is clear on their positions and purpose. It is better to host a smaller event that is well organized than a larger event that leaves a bad impression. Remember the public sees your Grange as one organization, not as each individual. It's all about quality over quantity.

Events - when successful - are a worthy investment and a critical part of marketing your Grange to the public. They offer a unique way to reach others about what your Grange has to offer. With a well-executed event, your Grange becomes memorable, and your event an experience worth remembering.

# Past State Master Edgar L. Tucker



Edgar Leroy Tucker was born on March 3, 1885, in Lebanon, Connecticut, to Edgar J. Tucker and Louise (Manning) Tucker.

Hereceived his education in the local grammar and high schools and the University of Connecticut at Storrs, Connecticut.

On June 22, 1909, he married Cora Dimmock, of Gurleyville, in the Town of Mansfield, Connecticut. She was the daughter of George R. Dimmock and Agnes M. (Cross) Dimmock and niece of Governor Wilbur Cross.

To them was born, Leroy Dimmock Tucker.

Brother Tucker was a man of high character and always put whatever interest he had above personal gain. The many phases of Agriculture received his ardent attention and for years he was Overseer and Farm Manager of the Farms owned by the Bridgeport Hydraulic Company. He served as Secretary of the Board of Education in the township of Trumbull, and as Grand Juror and Fire Warden for that district. He was a Republican in his political beliefs and a member of the Congregational Church. He was an active Mason and member of the Eastern Star.

He held many Subordinate, Pomona and State Grange offices, some of which include the following: Master of Trumbull Grange, Master of Fairfield County Pomona, Fairfield County Pomona Deputy, Assistant

Steward of the State Grange, Steward of the State Grange, and 16<sup>th</sup> Master of the present Connecticut State Grange for 1938-39, and upon the Executive Committee of the State Grange when

his untimely death stopped his labors for the Grange he loved in 1943.

His wife, Cora Dimmock Tucker served as Chairman of the National Grange Home Economics Committee from 1939-1941.

He took a vital interest in the Rural Roads Association and "Get Connecticut Out of the Mud" movement and was instrumental largely for its success in that area. He was a Trustee of the New **England Grange Building** erected on the grounds of the Eastern States Exposition in West Springfield, MA, giving it his loyal support, and served as its first Treasurer, an office, he held at the time of his death. He took part in the cornerstone laying services which were held on that famous day

wherever Grange projects were carried out, Brother Tucker was to be found, for next to his love for his country and his church came the Grange.

He personally organized Norfield Jr. Grange #3 and the following Juniors were organized by others during his administration: Natchaug #13, E. Hartford #26, Hope #27, Cheshire #28, Branford #29, Wallingford #30, Prospect #31, Winchester #32, Killingly #33, Tolland #34, Hebron #35, and Rock Rimmon #36. The following Subordinate Granges were also organized during his administration: Redding #15, Whigville #48, Hamden #99, Somers #105, and Falls Village #204.

He died on April 2, 1943 and was laid to rest in the beautiful Lawn Cemetery in Huntington, Connecticut.





# Mr. Ward goes to Washington

One Shelton resident returned from the free "trip of a lifetime" designed for veterans and is now advising all other veterans to jump at the opportunity to experience it for themselves.

WWII veteran and Shelton resident George Ward, 90, said he was reading a newspaper several months ago when he came across an article that said there was a non-prof it organization looking to fly out veterans to visit a variety of famous memorials for a weekend at no cost.

He called the number listed in the article and was ultimately sent an application in the mail that arrived several weeks later. After submitting his application, Ward was contacted by the organization, called "Honor Flight," and was told that WWII veterans were "first preference."

Ward was told that his service qualified him to be a part of the next trip to

by Aaron Berkowitz, D.C. along with 67 other also wheel him around. veterans from all over the country in June.

> the Army Air Corps in 1944 was a no brainer for him because if he waited to be drafted he wouldn't have an airplane mechanic.

> "If I had waited until October to be drafted I would've been in the Battle of the Bulge," said Ward. "Plus, my father was in WWI so from the time we were young he told us, 'You're going to have to serve,' so it wasn't as big of a deal."

> Ward was called into service when he was 18 years old, in February of 1945, and was shipped over to Germany where he worked on B-17's each day until December of that

"The war was still going on but the work wasn't bad,' said Ward, "Each morning we would begin our days at 7 a.m. by pre-flighting the planes and then the mechanics were free until about 2 or 3 p.m. when the planes would return."

When the pilots returned the planes, Ward said the mechanics' job was to put oil and gas into each of them to prepare them for the following day of flying.

One of the stipulations that Honor Flight made clear was that each veteran must have someone to accompany them at all times.

jumped at the opportunity to support her dad and

She flew out to D.C. from Maine, where she lives, to Ward said enlisting in accompany her dad and help create memories he and she most likely would never forget.

"It was an overall had the choice of becoming wonderful experience," said Ward.

> While looking at one of the Vietnam memorials, Ward said he was shocked at the amount of soldiers whose names were listed.

"I didn't even realize we had that many soldiers in Vietnam," said Ward.

Aside from posing for tons of pictures in front of the WWII and Lincoln memorials, both Ward and his daughter had the chance to interact with nearly 70 other veterans and their families.

Despite the number of veterans in the same area, Ward said they didn't spend any time talking to each other about their experiences or their service.

Nonetheless, Ward said an estimated 500 people surrounded the several buses carrying the veterans and their families once they arrived at one of the meeting sites in D.C.

Ward said he recommends all veterans look into the application process for this opportunity. The application can be found online at https://www.honorflight. org/veteran-application/.

The entire crew for Ward's daughter Barbara the service is volunteer, including the pilot and flight staff.



# WINDOW TO THE PAST

There are so many delicious fruits and vegetables that are in season in the month of August. Here's a twist on the classic Three-Bean Salad that has a Lemon Dressing from Panning the Globe. This is easy - and perfect for the next Grange Picnic or Potluck!



# Three-Bean Salad with Creamy Lemon Dressing

### INGREDIENTS:

#### **Dressing**

- ½ cup plain greek yogurt whole milk
- ¼ cup extra virgin olive oil
- 3 tablespoons fresh lemon juice
- ½ teaspoon finely minced garlic
- ½ teaspoon kosher salt

### Salad

- 1 pound green beans, washed, root end trimmed
- 1 pound yellow beans, washed, root end trimmed
- 2 tablespoons olive oil (to sauté onions)
- 2 medium red onions, sliced in half through the root. Each half thinly sliced crosswise
- 1/4 teaspoon salt (for the onions)
- 3 ripe plum tomatoes
- 1 15-ounce cans cannellini beans, drained and rinsed
- ½ cup, packed basil leaves, washed, dried, finely chopped

Kosher salt and fresh ground pepper, to taste

### **DIRECTIONS:**

Dressing: In a small bowl whisk yogurt and olive oil until creamy. Add lemon juice, garlic and salt, and whisk until creamy and fully combined. Set dressing aside.

Salad: Fill a large pot halfway with water and 2 teaspoons of salt. Bring to a boil. Add beans and cook until crisp-tender, 4-5 minutes. Using tongs, transfer beans to a large bowl of ice-water to stop the cooking process. Drain and refill the bowl with cold water. Drain and set aside.

Heat 2 tablespoons of olive oil in a medium skillet. Add onions and cook, over medium-low heat, stirring occasionally, for 10 minutes, until soft. Sprinkle with ¼ teaspoon salt. Set aside to cool.

Slice tomatoes in half lengthwise. Pull out the seeds and watery pulp. Dice the flesh. Set aside.

In a large bowl, combine green and yellow beans, onions, tomatoes, basil, and cannellini beans. Pour dressing on top and toss to combine. Season with salt and pepper, to taste.

(Can be made a day ahead. Let salad warm at room temp for 15 minutes or so and toss, before serving)

Serves: 10-12



### The Word is very near you



While it is true that there are many things we do not know about God, and many that we may never know, nevertheless it is also true that if we open up our hearts to God we will find him already present in us, and ready and anxious to teach us his ways and lead us in the paths of righteousness "for His name's sake". Why

should God want to lead us "for his name's sake"? Because if we do what God wants us to do we are glorifying God by our actions.

There are many mentions in scripture of the relationship between God's Word and following God's path. One that especially comes to mind is verse 105 of Psalm 119 that says ""Thy word is a lamp to my feet and a light to my path".


Moses told the assembled tribes of Israel:

"Now what I am commanding you today is not too difficult for you or beyond your reach. It is not in heaven, that you should say, 'Who will go up to heaven for us to get it for us and make us hear it, that we may observe it?' "Nor is it beyond the sea, that you should say, 'Who will cross the sea for us to get it for us and make us hear it, that we may observe it? No the word is very near you; it is in your mouth and in your heart so you may obey it. (...) For I command you today to love the Lord your God, to walk in obeience to him, and to keep his commands, decrees and laws."

A similar concept is carried by Jesus' statement that "The Kingdom of God is within you". It is foolish to look for God in other places; God dwells within our heart, the Grace of God is manifest in our inner being. We need look inwardly, not outwardly, if we truly seek God. And we will recognize the Kingdom of God within us and within our fellow beings by being filled with the Holy Spirit, and living in peacefulness and righteousness.

In conclusion, remember Paul's blessing at the end of his letter to the Romans:

"Now may the God of hope fill you with all joy and peace as you believe in Him, so that you may overflow with hope by the power of the Holy Spirit."



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
