
Do you want to grow your membership? My messages each month assume that you do.

The Grange Cane from Twain

The Mark Twain House, Hartford, CT



While packing the historical items of the State Grange on display at Good Will Grange Hall, the walking cane (pictured left) was discovered. It is hand-carved with the entire history of its creation and presentation engraved directly on it. The inscription reads:

"By Permission of the owner, This Cane was cut from a tree in the grounds of the home of the late noted humorist MARK TWAIN, Farmington Ave., Hartford, Conn., by William A. Willard, and carved by him and presented to the Good Will Grange of Glastonbury, Conn. To be in custody of the Master of the Grange or whom he directs. This cane carries with it the best wishes of members of the Newington Grange of which Mr. Willard is glad to say he is a member. Hartford, Conn., July 2, 1929."


The image at far left is the entire cane and the image next to it is a close-up image of the top, highlighting the wonderful detail that has managed to survive 90 years. The cane even includes an inscription towards the bottom indicating that the branch is from a Siberian poplar.

The cane likely came into the possession of the Conn. State Grange following the closing of Good Will Grange over 10 years ago.


Details of the inscriptions towards the top of the cane, below the head.

As we are starting to wind down on summer it is time to start thinking about fall and our upcoming State Grange session. Have you begun preparing or submitted any resolutions for the upcoming session? This last state legislative session brought up quite a variety of topics that we as Grange members may be interested in.

We saw the enactment of banning single use plastic bags pass the legislature this year. There were also bills which did not pass recommending the banning of Styrofoam food containers and plastic straws. What about expanding the bottle bill beyond soda and water bottles to include those plastic bottles of juices, teas, and sports drinks.

We saw the legalization of industrial hemp this year which allows our state farmers to begin growing and selling that product. What about the legalization of recreational marijuana? We already allow it for medical reasons. If it is legalized there must be ways to enforce laws such as impaired

driving. Is there a way to test for impairment like they do with alcohol?

There was a bill that passed the Senate but died in the House which would have established a task force to study ways to increase farmland availability for beginning farmers. It was to look at the costs of purchasing or renting farmland and the accessibility of farm financing. What do you think?

There is an increase in the bear population in this state with them breaking into homes. Should we now enact some sort of population control for bears, which could include the hunting of bears.

Of course, the big topic which will be returning is tolls. What is your feeling on tolls? We seem to agree that we need to improve our transportation infrastructure, but how are we going to pay for it?

These are just some topics that I remember. What are your feelings on topics being discussed in the state? Write a resolution.

Resolutions should be submitted to your local community Grange then onto your Pomona Granges for action. The deadline for resolutions for State Grange is September 15th. If it is received later than that we cannot guarantee that it will be printed in the State Grange program but it still could be presented at the session. Individuals can not

submit resolutions directly to State Grange, they must go through a Grange.

Enjoy Pumpkins

Pumpkins: Pumpkins are a good source of vitamins and are good to eat. They are a variety of winter squash like butternut or acorn squash. Winter squash are left on the vine until they are mature, have a hard rind and are baked for eating. Summer squash are picked off the vine while still green, have a soft rind and can be eaten raw or cooked. They do not store well and are eaten fresh.

If you want to have a decorated pumpkin but also want to save it for eating later you can use tempura markers to make your design on the outside without cutting it open.

Small pumpkins can be eaten as a vegetable, either steamed or boiled or battered and fried. They can be sliced thin and eaten raw with a dip. A little research on line has a wealth of information on how to select and cook fresh pumpkin. There you can find recipes for nut bread, roasted pumpkin seeds, pumpkin cheesecake and many more delicious ways to eat this nutritious vegetable.

GLEANINGS FROM YOUR STATE PUBLIC RELATIONS TEAM

What is your Grange pitch?

What is a pitch? A pitch is a short positive statement detailing a potential story, event, activity or project, with the goal being to catch the attention of the target audience (which in the case of the Grange is the media, the public, and even potential or existing members).

What methods do you use to get your Grange into the spotlight? With the media cycle passing by at lightning speeds, and attention spans shortening, information is often forgotten as quickly as it appears. This is where a strong pitch becomes an important part of your Grange public relations toolbox.

In order to navigate the communication waters, your Grange needs a creative, innovative, positive and interesting pitch to be sure to stand out in the crowd.

Here's a few tips and tricks to crafting that perfect pitch and get your Grange noticed.

- Stay Timely. Your Grange might have a vault of historical information you can draw off of when selling your Grange, just be sure to only use past information as a foundation. Stay relevant to today's Grange when crafting your pitch. Keeping up-to-date with trends and news stories is important for your Grange, so that you can execute a pitch that not only catches attention, it is current to the audience.

- Be Creative and Original. Thousands of pitches are sent to your local media on a weekly, if not daily, basis. These pitches are continually read and heard by the people you want to join and support your Grange. If your Grange does not stand out, it will be lost in the crowd and not gain the attention it deserves. Think beyond the boundaries of what you want to say, and

how your Grange can make an impact with the reader.

- Be Human. Make your Grange personal. People relate to emotions - it's a fact of life. If you are pitching your Grange on a level that hits below the surface with your audi-

ence, there is a good chance your Grange will not only engage but garner good coverage in the media.

Make a lasting impression by encouraging your audience to say "Aww" or "Wow" when they read/hear your pitch.

The manner in which you pitch your Grange is important - and can make all the difference in the amount of attention your Grange receives. Pitch your Grange in a timely, creative, and human angle, and the likelihood of making an impact on your audience will increase ten-fold.



Fresh Apple Cake

No meal is complete without dessert - particularly special summertime barbecues, picnics and potlucks. This recipe doe Apple Cake from Southern Living is perfect for the next Grange picnic!

CAKE:

1 1/2 cups chopped pecans, divided	2 cups flour
1 stick butter, melted	2 teaspoons cinnamon
2 cups sugar	1 teaspoon baking soda
2 eggs	1 teaspoon salt
1 teaspoon vanilla extract	
4 large Granny Smith apples, peeled and cut into wedges	

CREAM CHEESE FROSTING:

1 (8-ounce) package cream cheese, softened
3 tablespoons butter or margarine, softened
1 1/2 cups powdered sugar
1/8 teaspoon salt

CAKE DIRECTIONS:

Preheat oven to 350°. Bake pecans in a single layer in a shallow pan 5 to 7 minutes or until lightly toasted and fragrant, stirring halfway through.

Combine butter, sugar, eggs, and vanilla extract in a large bowl until blended. Combine flour, salt, cinnamon, baking soda and butter mixture, stirring until blended. Stir in apples and 1 cup pecans. Spread thick batter into a lightly greased 13- x 9-inch pan.

Bake at 350° for 45 minutes. Remove from oven when a wooden pick inserted in center comes out clean. Cool completely in pan on a wire rack for 30-45 minutes.

Spread frosting on cake and sprinkle with remaining pecans.

FROSTING DIRECTIONS:

Beat cream cheese and butter at medium speed with an electric mixer until creamy. Gradually add sugar and salt, beating until blended. Stir in vanilla.

For those that are curious, I have included pictures of the new office with this article. Even though it's tucked away in the Northwest Hills, it's still YOUR State Grange office, ready to serve you as it always has been.

With the move behind us, we're ready to jump head first into State Session. How's that for a segue?

On pages 2-4 of this issue I have included all of the necessary information for the 135th Annual Session of the State Grange, Oct. 17-19, 2019 in Norwich. The same information will be included in the Official Call to Session to be mailed to each Grange at the beginning of August.

The Call will also include the delegate cards to be completed by your Grange's Secretary once your Grange has selected its delegates. All Pomona and Subordinate (Community) Granges are entitled to select two (2) delegates to State Session (as long as your Grange is entitled to be seated at Session). Granges in arrears for dues for the second quarter of the year are automatically suspended from eligibility to be seated at Session until all dues are current. Please be certain this is done when you submit your registrations for session. Junior Granges are entitled to one (1) delegate and the same rules

regarding alternates apply to Junior Granges as well.

Please DO NOT submit alternate delegates on your credential cards. They cannot be accepted as credentialed delegates should one or both of your chosen delegates be unable to attend. It is your right, as a Grange to select alternate delegates in the event that one or both of your delegates are unable to serve. This, however, cannot be done in advance.

Also, please DO not mail both credential cards back to the State Grange. One card (as indicated on the card) is intended to be completed and returned to the State Grange and the other (as indicated) is intended to be completed and given to your delegates to present at Registration when they arrive at State Session.

PLEASE send in your registrations as soon as possible and be sure to make your reservations with the Holiday Inn as soon as you can to be certain rooms are available. This hotel can fill up fast due to its proximity to Mohegan Sun and Foxwoods.

It has been mentioned elsewhere in this issue, but it is worth repeating... there is only ONE resolution in the "hopper" to be considered at State Session. Yes, there is still time to get resolutions

in, but the clock is ticking. As has been the case in the last several years, I will accept resolutions up until the time the Session Book goes to press at the beginning of October. However, I don't guarantee when specifically it will go to print, so Granges hoping to get them printed in the book need to be in touch with me. Resolutions that arrive late, will have to be submitted with 125 copies (as required by vote of the delegate body).

It is also important that ALL resolutions be adopted by a Subordinate/Community Grange and/or a Pomona Grange before being submitted to the State Grange for consideration. Resolutions submitted by individuals without consideration of a prior Grange will not be accepted.

Because there has been so much going on with the State Grange in recent months, I was unable to get out order sheets for Dues Receipts. This will be your fair warning, unless I hear from you within the first couple weeks of August, your Grange will receive the same order you received last year. If your Grange needs to increase/decrease your order, please let me know as soon as possible.





Create in me a clean heart, O God,
and renew a right spirit within me.
Cast me not away from your presence,
and take not your Holy Spirit from me.
Restore to me the joy of your salvation,
and uphold me with a willing spirit.

(from Psalm 51)

It has been said that one can find in the Psalms a reflection of every human emotion and need. Frequent reading of the Psalms allows one to recall certain passages when they are appropriate to a situation. Psalm 51 is devoted to asking God to cleanse us from sin, to forgive our sins, and lastly to allow us to accept that forgiveness by cleansing our hearts of the scars that sinning has left in us. As we should all know, God is ever willing and anxious to forgive our sins if we ask and truly repent of them. But it is a human weakness that we have trouble accepting that we are forgiven.

There are three ways we can go wrong when it comes to matters of forgiveness. All three can poison the heart. First is not forgiving others; second is not asking God to be forgiven, when he is always



willing to do so; and third is not truly accepting that we have been forgiven. This is a problem more common than perhaps you realize. I know people who are still burdened with the guilt of things they did many years ago, and cannot accept that God has forgiven them, even though they have prayed for forgiveness. I don't know why this is so difficult, but it is. I, myself, have occasionally had difficulty with the same problem. God has forgiven me; why can't I forgive myself? Reciting to myself the above section from Psalm 51 as a sort of prayer has been of help at those times.

One other thing that may ease guilt is to carry out some action which compensates for the wrong things that you may have done. The possibilities here are endless and I leave it up to your

own imagination, but often we feel less guilty if we can do some good, either for those we might have hurt or for others who need help of some sort. Remember that such actions are not an attempt to "buy" forgiveness; God has already forgiven you. Rather consider it to be a Thank Offering for God's mercy and love.
