fiancée Stephanie took the degree. Congratulations, Stephanie!

I want to update you with a recap of the highlights of the 140 or so resolutions all of which were brought to the floor in one fashion of another. Our Connecticut State Grange resolution on honoring 80 year members was withdrawn as the issue has been addressed with the printing of a new and very attractive certificate to accompany the traditional letter from the National Grange President. The resolution on college interest rates was adopted. On the agricultural subject, the National Grange remains opposed to regulatory over reach which can negatively affect our farmers, foreign acquisition of American farmland, labeling lab created meat product as "meat," and favors legal definition of cannabis as a crop for insurance purposes. Conservation policy aims in the same direction so far as to aid farmers without hindering them.

A study committee will be put together to consider options for location of the National Grange headquarters once our three year lease is up at 1616 H Street.

In the Health and Education area a resolution on medications and procedures related to family planning was adopted after quite a little debate on this contentious issue. The Grange continues to support insurance coverage for cancer testing and adopted a resolution covering those in high risk occupations.

Under Grange Growth, resolution requiring use of the electronic payment system BILL for payments made to National was rejected. Also rejected was a resolution making dues collection a top down process instead of bottom up as it is now. Several resolutions concerning the location of the National Grange Convention at sea as opposed to on land were rejected, and so the next convention will be held at sea on the Carnival Horizon for a change.

Most important was the adopted resolution from Texas concerning a National Grange dues increase. They will now be \$20 per year for Subordinate members and \$40 for a family. This is a needed change considering our membership statistics and the only way to reverse it is if we INCREASE membership.

Another resolution debated at length was one on delegate representation from large versus small Grange states. Decreasing the number of delegates from small Grange states tends to make them feel left out of the conversation at convention. This issue was referred to a committee for study.

Brothers and Sisters, the Subordinate member participation in Zoom programs by Amanda Brozana for Membership/Leadership and Phil Vonada for Communications remain at an all-time low. These programs are well planned, presented by knowledgeable folks, and are fun to attend. You can meet Grangers from the other Grange regions. Because they involve people from around the country, I believe you would find them to be very helpful in planning your work and getting new ideas. Phil and Amanda are very willing to help you all in any way they can. The National Grange does offer you a lot.

There was also discussion on the subject of meeting style as it connects to out IRS tax exemption as a fraternal organization. Some of us meet traditionally with the opening and closing ritual, along with the display of the American flag and book of scripture on the altar, while other "meet around the kitchen table." Legally to maintain the validity of the IRS exemption, the ritualistic aspects of Grange are a required element and their absence COULD technically lead to a loss of your exemption. Timed out, the rituals take about five to six minutes of meeting time so it is not a large time requirement. They are not that onerous either! This is really what makes a Grange a GRANGE.

Connecticut State Grange is once again an Honor Grange for 2023-2024. Granges in Action included Wallingford #33, Vernon #52, Ekonk Community Junior #101, and Riverton #169.

In National Grange Lecturer Department contests, State Lecturer Dave Roberts won first place in the Design a Program/Adult/External, second place in the State/County/Community Fair photo contest and honorable mention for monument category in photos. I took second place in the Weather Watcher Challenge contest... though there were only two entries! Oh, well.

In January, we have Northeast Leaders' Conference coming up to be held in Danvers, Massachusetts. MSG President Corey Spence has a great event planned with a tour of a local vocational agricultural school. It looks like National Leaders Conference this year will be held in the Sonoma Valley of California. These are always interesting.

Hello, I'm back! I promised to turn in my soap box and play nice.

The 2024 elections are over, the ballots are all counted and Donald Trump won the majority of the votes and the Electoral College votes to be the 47th President of the United States. The Senate and House are both led by the Republican Party. The voting machines all work and no fraud was found. The newlyelected President is already filling his staff and department heads, a lot of head scratching on some choices, but he promised to have the best and brightest to lead us into a better Nation. For those who voted for them, I wish you get all that were promised to you. We all need to involve ourselves in community programs and group activities, as there will be a great need for volunteers.

I thank all the Granges for the resolutions at the 140th Session of the Connecticut State Grange. The resolutions on Student Loans and College Tuition passed and went on to National Grange where I heard they passed along with resolutions from other State Granges with similar resolves.

The Eversource billing outcry was met with a petition to the Governor to correct this program to relieve this added cost to electric bills. There should be a course of action that consumers can take against corporations who decide on major investments, but when there is a delay or failure in delivery, the corporation demands the consumer to pay for the failed contracts. The consumer had no voice in the deal so why should we bail the corporation out for a poor deal? This practice is happening more and more, let

the consumer pay for our mistakes, that part of customer service, I don't think so! Let's make corporations responsible for their decisions.

In October and November we had a lot of food recalls in products like Boar's Head cold cuts, waffles, McDonald's Quarter Pounders (e-coli in onions), raw milk, and most recently, carrots. Most of this is related to cleanliness. Many food processing plants are able to hire

14 year olds to clean up facilities. Smithfield Pork was just fined \$20 million for underage workers working in an unsafe environment. The Grange promotes the protection fo our youth from danders and laborious tasks.

I wish to welcome Barbara Prindle of Taghhannuck Grange and Aili McKeen of Wallingford Grange to the committee and will be meeting soon. Happy holidays and an eventful New Year to you all

This was my second time as a delegate. We started with 140 resolutions and 10 more from committees. Each was brought to the floor to be discussed with 56 passing. Some of the ones that passed were CT 514 regarding Interest Rates for College Loans, PA 316 regarding Student Debt Forgiveness Tax Credit for Ag Business, PA 311 regarding Farmers Who Provide Student Loans to Their Workers Forgiveness. These were some of the student debt resolutions. There were other resolutions that passed like CA 307 Artificial Intelligence, 301 Age Limits for Congress and Senate, OR 504 Medicare and Demential Better Support for Dimentia Patients, NC 101 Tracking Carbon Emissions by Farmers. Resolutions were defeated regarding MD 713, National Dues for Junior Grange Members. This resolution was passed last year and required a favorable vote this year to be enacted. Grange Law Bill 726 regarding National Grange Dues Insrease passed but requires a second vote next year for passage. This year budget was clear showing last year's and this year's numbers. We still had to take interest money to balance the budget. There were resolutions that came out of committee to give each delegate \$700 next year towards room costs.

Thank you all again for allowing me to serve the Connecticut State Grange.





We are planning for a CPR course to be held in the coming weeks that will be open to the community. It's not enough to have the equipment. We need to have members trained in the use of the equipment and in CPR.



Lecturer's Department

At the 158th National Grange convention in Bettendorf, Iowa, National Grange President Christine E. Hamp made a signifi-



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cant announcement that marked a new chapter for our fraternal organization. She revealed that the Grange would launch "Project Sustenance" to spotlight the talents and expertise of our members to address food insecurity across the United States. This initiative aims to harness the collective knowledge of other national partners, Grange members and their communities, particularly in the realms of homesteading, agriculture, and food production, to combat one of the nation's most pressing issues: hunger. During her national address, President Hamp said "No organization is better situated than the Grange to better our communities. I am calling on each Grange to make food security and nutrition a priority"

This new focus on food insecurity was highlighted in a series of seminars during the National Convention that featured Grange members sharing their knowledge and strategies. I was honored to be asked to present on this new focus area that directly ties into the Grange's overarching goal of using member expertise to alleviate hunger.

My workshop focused on the broader issue of food insecurity. As a longtime advocate for sustainable food systems and a fourth generation Grange member, I addressed hunger at both the community and national levels. My seminar delved into the root causes of food insecurity, discussing economic, social, and environmental factors that contribute to hunger in rural and urban areas alike.

I stressed the need for a multifaceted approach to solving food insecurity, one that includes not only local food production but also policy advocacy, resource distribution, and support for food banks and other community organizations. I highlighted successful models of food cooperatives, urban gardening projects, and local food hubs, encouraging Grange members to consider these solutions as part of their broader efforts to combat hunger at the local level. I also highlighted that every county in the United States has residents facing food insecurity.


This session on food insecurity exemplifies the Grange's new focus on community-driven solutions to hunger. By providing practical skills and encouraging broader systemic change, my seminar served as a call to action for all Grangers to become more involved in addressing food insecurity in your communities.

President Chris Hamp's announcement and my seminar made it clear that the National Grange is committed to leveraging its collective expertise and resources to address hunger in the U.S. With dedicated members leading the way, the Grange is poised to play a significant role in creating sustainable, long-term solutions to food insecurity across the country.

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You Shall Love the Lord

Deuteronomy 6:5 "You shall love the Lord your God with all your heart and with all your soul and with all your might."

This commandment, both as it appears in Deuteronomy and as it appears in various forms in Matthew, Mark, and Luke, has always bothered me in that I wondered HOW it was possible to "love" because vou were commanded to "love". Doesn't true love come from the heart? So I went back to how the commandment was interpreted by Rabbinic tradition. And while I am Christian, not Jewish, I perceived that the interpretation seemed to be that one cannot separate the one commandment from the related commandment to love one's neighbor. We show our love of God by the act of loving others.

Another factor is that we cannot learn to truly love God until we learn to understand God. When we try with all our heart to understand God and God's commandments we will slowly find ourselves closer to loving God. To use the words of a



song from 1958 "To know him is to love him". So the command to love the Lord with all your heart and with all your soul and all your might is a direction to strive with everything you have to truly get to know the Lord and what the Lord expects us to do in following His commandments. And if we try so to do then we will eventually learn to love the Lord.

There is a maxim we use in the art of teaching. "I hear; I forget. I see; I remember. I do; I understand". If we only hear the command to "love the Lord" we are probably going to forget it within a short period of

time after hearing it. If we observe other people showing their love for the Lord by their actions towards their fellow human beings, we are apt to remember those actions. But when we ourselves show love and caring for all of humanity we will finally begin to understand loving God by loving others.
