FOUNDERS OF THE GRANGE

On December 4, 1867 in a small Washington, D.C. building that housed the office of William Saunders, Superintendent of Propagating Gardens in the Department of Agriculture, the Order of Patrons of Husbandry, more commonly known as the Grange, was born. Here, sitting around a plain wooden table, a group of seven earnest men, planned what was destined to become a vital force in preserving and expanding American democracy. They were all men of vision - they had faith in God, in their fellow man and the future. The Seven Founders of the Order of the Patrons of Husbandry were:

Oliver H. Kelley, William Saunders, Aaron B. Grosh, William M. Ireland, John R. Thompson, Francis McDowell and John Trimble. Trimble was assisted by Caroline Hall, who was later named an honorary 8th founder of the Grange.

Their names are inscribed on a Birthplace Marker located near the site of the original building on the south side of 4th Street SW, near Madison Street on the mall in Washington D. C. The marker was officially dedicated on Sept. 9, 1951, and is the only private monument on the mall.

OUR NATIONAL HEADQUARTERS

The 11-story landmark National Grange headquarters building in Washington, D.C. was dedicated by President Dwight D. Eisenhower on June 29, 1960, and is the only private edifice in a federal block across from the White House. It serves as a non-governmental headquarters for agricultural and rural families. A professional staff administers policies established annually by democratic Grange processes at local, county, and state levels.

THE FIRST CONNECTICUT STATE GRANGE

National Deputy Levi Hubbell of Iowa came to Connecticut and organized the existing Subordinate Granges here into a State Grange. It was the 33rd State Grange to be organized. Granges number 1 through 20 were active at the time. In looking at the list only Stafford #1, Granby #5, and Redding #15 are still active today.

Misunderstanding and poorly defined rules and regulations led to disputes between different sections of the State. The ritual was not understood and dues were so low that Granges did not have enough money to operate properly. The State Master, Harvey Godard, resigned in 1878 and this lead to the end of the First Connecticut State Grange.

THE SECOND CONNECTICUT STATE GRANGE

Sherman Kimberly of West Torrington, who was elected State Master after Brother Godard resigned, was appointed as a National Deputy. June 24, 1885, he was able to assemble delegates from sixteen Subordinate Granges in Glastonbury and the Second Connecticut State Grange was organized. The Fifth Degree was used as the State Degree for the First State Grange and in 1885 and 1886. After that the National Grange allowed the State Grange the honor of conferring the Sixth Degree on its' candidates.

A MEMORIAL SERVICE FROM THE FORMER TOTOKET GRANGE

Lecturer: We cherish a living memory of these, our Brothers and Sisters of our order, whose chairs are now vacant. We know that our Grange is richer because they have lived and labored amongst us. Make us ever grateful for the heritage that is ours, and may we be worthy, that when the portals swing open for us, we find outstretched hands to welcome us to that fair land, where parting is no more. And so we light a candle for those who wait beyond the vale.

Master: Worthy Secretary will you read the role of our departed ones? (Secretary reads the names while Chaplain lights candles.)

Chaplain: Afterglow. I'd like the memory of me to be a happy one. I'd like to leave an afterglow of smiles when day is done. I'd like to leave an echo whispering softly down the waves of happy times and laughing times in bright and sunny days. I'd like the tears of those who grieve to dry before the sun of happy memories that I leave behind when day is done. Do not stand at my grave and cry, I did not die. My memory lingers on. Let us pray together The Lord's Prayer.

Chaplain: Father we ask Thee to be with us as we close this service and return to our homes, comfort those whose hour is here and strengthen us to Thy service.
